City Council Redistricting

Wednesday, October 23, 2021, at 10 a.m. Location: Anthony Community Center 345 N. Jacob St., Visalia, CA 93291

- I. Welcome from Allison Mackey, Communications Manager
- II. Introduction of Ken Chawkins, National Demographic Corporation
 - Mr. Chawkins explained that previously scheduled presenter Jeff Tilton was unavailable due to multiple family emergencies.
- III. Introduction of Maria Mejia-Ng, Radiant Valley Interpreting
 - Ms. Mejia-Ng shared a brief introduction in both English and Spanish and provided information on the workshop's Spanish interpretation available.
- IV. Presentation from Ken Chawkins, National Demographic Corporation
 - Mr. Chawkins began his PowerPoint presentation, included on page three of these notes
 - Mr. Chawkins explained the process the City had undertaken so far, included explanation of the California Census process and how the data has to be adjusted for prisoner population. Noted that NDC found a "great number of errors".

Discussed redistricting rules and goals, Mr. Chawkins made it through approximately four slides before stopping the PowerPoint presentation and facilitating the meetings move to a group discussion and began taking questions from the public in attendance

V. Questions and Group Discussion

Feedback on Communities of Interest and Districts

- St. John's should be one district
- North of Santa Fe should be one district
- The housing development The Lakes should be a community of interest

- The "north side" should be recognized and "bunched with more like communities"
- There should be a community of interest in the City's "north area"
- State Route 198 should be a divider, communities above and below should be split into different districts
- State Route 198 should not be a divider, "we pride ourselves on not having the City divided by the 198"
- Youth and diversity should be guides for the redistricting process
- Socioeconomic status should not be a significant indicator of community of interest
- Each district should have effective representation with diversity of age, affluence, and ethnicity
- Consider "high propensity voting" areas when drawing districts
- Visalia has a "history of redlining and still, to some extent, potholes don't get fixed but new schools or houses are going up"
- Look at areas that have been redlined in the past and work to ensure new district lines can assist these areas in "catching up"
- Candidate incumbency should not be considered when drawing districts
- "No one runs" was stated, as was, "The Council is one political party and we need to create competition"
- Would like a map where "there are districts where basic needs are met in each district"
- There "should be focus on community building, where there are centers of influence in each district, where each district has their basic needs met"

Specific Requests

- NDC upload the necessary Census data as soon as possible
- It was noted by an attendee that NDC had the data for 30 days by the second mapping workshop
- NDC should not use Google Translate on paper map materials
- Mapping tools be accessible and include City of Visalia data as soon as possible
- A map overlay of the City's General Plan
- A map overlay of City Zoning
- A map overlay of the Tulare County Board of Supervisor Districts
- A map overlay that shows "where the Hispanic population lives"
- Two maps that are "influenced by the community" voted on by the community as official community recommendations to be considered by the City Council

- "Two of the three maps presented to the City Council should be community approved"
- Specific training for the public on each mapping tool
- This training should include computers for each attendee to try out the tool and draw maps in real time
- Public Hearings and City Council meetings should have Public Comment on Redistricting extended beyond the three-minute period
- This extension should occur for all citizens wishing to speak, but should be particularly considered for those requiring their comments to be translated into English
- Find a way for the public to review all submitted maps in a public forum

Future Meetings

- Attendees noted that all meetings should have:
 - Have official transcriber at each meeting
 - Have virtual options for attending and participating through Zoom
 - Be recorded and available to citizens after the meeting
 - Have Spanish language translation recorded
 - Have PowerPoint presentation available in Spanish
 - Have all materials presented and available as hand-outs in preprepared packets (in both English and Spanish) and those packets should then be posted online
 - Only be hosted in buildings with accessible WiFi
 - Been publicly posted at facilities, including City buildings, but also schools, County and State offices
 - Send specific invitations to the community groups Proteus, Community Water Center and Self-Help

Additional Feedback

- Column three on the PowerPoint presentation slide "makes it look like the City will be provided a faulty map"
- "This space needed something different today than what was scheduled, we need conversations with the City"
- Want emphasis on outreach to the community, more community meetings, more presentations to local groups, especially those that work with minority groups, "would love to see personal invitations for involvement"
- Citizens are "tossed back and forth between representatives"
- "Council and Tulare County Board of Supervisors aren't coming together and attending, they need to know what the underlying issues are"

Meeting was held on Saturday, October 23, 2021 at 10 a.m. to approximately 12:45 p.m. at the Anthony Community Center.

There were 18 members of the public in attendance.

Defining Neighborhoods

1st Question: What is your neighborhood?

2nd Question: What are its geographic boundaries?

Examples of physical features defining a neighborhood boundary:

- Natural neighborhood dividing lines, such as highway or major roads, rivers, canals and/or hills
- Areas around parks or schools
- Other neighborhood landmarks

In the absence of public testimony, planning records and other similar documents may provide definition.





Beyond Neighborhoods: Defining Communities of Interest

1st Question: What defines your community?

- Geographic Area, plus
- Shared issue or characteristic
 - Shared social or economic interest
 - Impacted by city policies
- Tell us "your community's story"

2nd Question: Would this community benefit from being "included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation"?

Or would it benefit more from having multiple representatives?

Definitions of Communities of Interest may <u>not</u> include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.

 - Powerful, data-rich "Draw a draft map" tool


Whether you use the powerful (but complicated) online mapping tool, Excel, the paper kit, or just draw on a napkin, we welcome your maps!

- Includes overlays of "community of interest" and other data







Simple Map Drawing Tool

- Total Population Counts only – no demographic numbers




Simple Map Drawing Tool + Excel Supplement
